

Help is on the Way

Forest County Potawatomi, Potawatomi Hotel & Casino donate \$100K to Hurricane relief

Millions of people have been impacted recently by unrelenting weather in the United States. The first to endure the epic hurricanes in September, 2017 were those in Texas when Hurricane Harvey battered the state's gulf coast.

Shortly after Harvey made landfall, the Forest County Potawatomi Community and Milwaukee's Potawatomi Hotel & Casino stepped up, donating \$100,000 to help the victims impacted in the hurricane's wake.

Flanked by Potawatomi Hotel & Casino Chief Executive Officer Rodney Ferguson, Tribal Treasurer Joe Daniels presented the \$100,000 check during a live fundraiser for The Salvation Army on WDJT-TV, Milwaukee's CBS affiliate.

"From generation to generation, in our community we have always had the initiative to want to reach out and share ... especially at times of need like this," Daniels told CBS 58.

All of the money will go directly to the victims of the devastation. ♦

A new grant has been awarded to the FCP Information Technology (IT) department in 2017, which is administered through the Administration for Native Americans (ANA). It is a grant titled Fostering Independence, Leadership and Mentoring (FILM) and its focus is on educating youth in the skills of video production.

The goal will be to enable youth to have their voices expressed in a creative way and to learn all the tools of the trade involved. This grant will be in place for the next three years, and the youth who have participated in the program will then be mentors for future participants.

David Herkert, FILM coordinator – level 3 technician, is the mastermind behind this project, working on it with the help of his IT teammates. Herkert envisioned this back in 2014 and with hard work and dedication he has seen this dream come true. He says, “Giving these students the ability to present and showcase their voices are what this is all about. It will help raise their self-esteem and encourage them to explore different issues they may be interested in. It will be helpful in their schooling

and will inspire them to create in the video arena. Maybe it will even lead to jobs in the future in video production.”

Herkert has an extensive resumé when it comes to video production. His background includes 20+ years of experience in producing 30-60-second commercials for three different companies in the tri-state region of Missouri, southern Illinois and Kentucky. Prior to that, he had been the director of the student-run television station at Southern Illinois University. During this time, he provided a 24-hour programming schedule that included student-produced shows such as soap operas, news shows, narratives, documentaries, music videos and talk shows.

FILM will consist of 20-25 different workshops starting in April, 2018 and running throughout the summer months when it will be most intensive. During these workshops, the students will learn about script writing, directing, producing, set design, and even some acting. If there are drama students in the community, this is a perfect time to present your talent in front of a camera.

Along with these workshops comes working with equipment, which Herkert says is state-of-the-art and includes studio equipment, a master control room, a couple of editing bays, and field production equipment.

The program is aimed towards students in the age range of 13-18 and who must meet certain educational criteria to participate. It is open to FCP tribal member youth first and then as time goes on, spaces will open to community members and non-tribal youth. In addition, having the drive to succeed, ambition and creativity never hurts in being selected to participate in this program.

Chris Luter, chief information officer, stressed, “The goal here isn’t to film the latest powwow or to talk about the language. The goal is to talk about what the kids want to talk about—the problems they’re facing and the things they want to have a voice around. This has been made very loud and clear from Council. There might be some touchy subjects that students may reach into here and that’s going to be okay.”

Overseeing this program will be an advisory board which will be made up of nine people, including both tribal high school/college students, tribal members, IT employees and education employees. The board will lend advice to the pre-planning of shows and the film production. Herkert says, “I met with everyone who is on this team and I feel everyone has a great ability to contribute to this. Each person has talents that they can bring to help guide the students in this project.”

This project is going to be the start of an amazing creative outlet for the youth to express themselves and show what matters most to them. Herkert says if this program takes off, “These tribal youth will be the pathfinders leading the way in the tribe’s pursuit of a television channel/station. This idea may

be a year or two away, but building content and building the talent pool for this endeavor will be the keystone for building a great communications tool for the tribe and a voice from FCP to the outside world.” He also mentions, “I want to thank everyone who has been involved in the project, especially the FCP Grants department. Without their help this would not be possible.”

This is a groundbreaking and most up-to-date program for this day and age. It will bring many future opportunities for the tribe and it will show the next generation what they can really do and accomplish.

The youth that start this program are going to be the pioneers of something that will eventually be an astounding achievement for this community!

Looking to the future, some exciting events include a youth-focused talk show, Mad Dog & Merrill collaborations and a horror film. Guest speakers, professionals and cinematographers from around the world are eager to come inspire and teach the kids. Northern Nails

A Story of Hope

There are people in this world who go through hard times either physically and/or emotionally. They can choose to either stay in the resulting funk or choose to pick themselves up and say, "I'm not going to allow myself to feel this way any longer". FCP tribal member Robin Spencer is one of those who has chosen to pick themselves up out of that funk and say, "I will no longer continue to feel like this for my own sake, and most importantly, for my children and husband." She was very willing to open up to *PTT* and talk about her life before becoming a new business owner here in the area.

Perhaps her story will help others see that not everyone's life is all bunnies and rainbows. Things happen, life happens and stuff is thrown at you that you would never even suspect and you have to choose how to deal with it. This is her story.

Spencer was a stay-at-home mom for the majority of her life taking care of her daughter Helena, her husband, and, of course, handling daily household chores and responsibilities. In 2011, she fell into a deep depression after losing her baby girl, Annabelle. This is a heartbreaking scenario for any parent to even imagine much less experience. The road after this heartbreak tested Spencer in many ways as she

fell deeper into her depression. She told *PTT*, “Things even got worse after my son, Rowdy, was born a few years ago. I became extremely depressed and secluded — even more so than before. I know that I was showing extreme signs of postpartum depression, and on top of my daughter’s death, things just became really scary for me. I was at a point of seeing no way out.” Spencer then realized that she could not keep living this way. She said, “I was never leaving my house. My son would be home with me all day, kept in the house and not going out adventuring and seeing things or experiencing life as a child should. I was basically smothering him. I knew I couldn’t keep doing this to him and for my older daughter to see this was not healthy either. You need to show your children what is out in this world and what they can do and accomplish.”

Spencer then told *PTT* that with help from her husband and daughter who she says were her biggest cheerleaders she started working her way out of the house she had felt barricaded in. She started working with Emy, Owner of Emy’s Salon and Gifts & Flowers from the Heart, in Wabeno, Wis. She recalled, “I started working on flower arrangements here and just helping Emy out where needed. We then had people starting to come in and ask if manicures/pedicures were done here. Then Emy jokingly said, “Maybe you should start doing nails, Robin.” Of course, after that this thought played over in my mind and then it finally clicked and I said, ‘I should.’”

Spencer decided to enroll in Nail Technology at the State College of Beauty in September of 2016. With hard work, determination, battling Wisconsin winters and driving every single day back and forth, she ended up with her degree Jan. 3, 2017. The day after receiving her degree, she immediately went to Appleton to purchase ALL the supplies she needed to start her trade. She said, “I knew that if I didn’t jump on this right now, I would have gotten pulled back into my depression, and that is something I did not want to go back to. I decided I either dive in head first, or not at all.” This opened a new door for her and her business is now housed in the same building as Emy’s Salon.

Spencer rents a space from Emy and does anything and everything associated with manicures/pedicures. Spencer did not stop her education after getting her Nail Technology degree. She persisted in finding out what else she could do with this. As Spencer says, “This degree has taught me the basics of nail technology. Number one is sanitation and, in addition, I learned the common practices of being in this profession. Not only did I learn what I needed to know to open my own business, I did my own research into learning more and stumbled across the North American School of Podology.” Here Spencer learned how to take care of and maintain people’s feet when they have medical conditions such as diabetes. As Spencer

said, “It really is crucial to take care of your feet especially if you have a health condition.

I ended up getting my certificate in Advanced Foot Care from this school. I am one of only two in the state of Wisconsin who is certified in this field. I love continuing my education in all aspects of this area and, of course, I am addicted to learning.”

Not only has Spencer been climbing the ladder in this specialty, but with her perseverance and dedication she has been a great role model for her daughter, Helena, who is going to cosmetology school as we speak. She says, “You know, I didn’t just want to teach her that things are just handed to you in life. I wanted to show her that YOU have to get out there and do things yourself. If you want to do something in life, get motivated and start searching. I am very proud of her taking this step in her life and pursuing something instead of just waking up and staying inside the house all day like I once did. I know that not only did I pull myself out of this depression for me, but I did it for my children as well. I did it to help show them that there is so much in life you can pursue — you just have to do it for YOU!”

Spencer’s story is one of heartbreak at times but it also goes to show that someone can be at their absolute lowest in life and still pull themselves up and realize that you are only given one life so do the best you can with it. Don’t expect things to be handed to you. Expect that you have to work towards what you really want and know that others may be looking to you as an example so always show your best abilities.

MILWAUKEE COUNTY COURT WELCOMES FCP WELLNESS COURT

On Thursday, March 2, 2017, Forest County Potawatomi (FCP) Tribal Court judges and staff spent the day touring and visiting the Milwaukee County Courthouse. The visit was part of the ongoing education and communication that has been occurring between state and tribal courts.

"I'm grateful to Chief Judge Maxine White," Chief Judge White-Fish said. "We can learn from each other." The day started at 9 a.m. in the Chief Judge's office. Various court officials including Milwaukee County judges and clerks greeted the FCP judges and staff and provided an overview of their jobs and responsibilities.

After the introductions, choices were offered for observation: criminal, civil, children's, family, drug court, guardianships, small claims and probate. Due to the opening of the Forest County Wellness Court, several FCP judges and staff observed Milwaukee's Drug Court.

Lunch was provided at Chief Judge White's office. During lunch, other Milwaukee County judges joined FCP judges and staff. Stories and experiences were shared.

After lunch, the observations continued. The clerks toured the massive Milwaukee County Clerk operations. Some staff returned to the Drug Court while others observed a criminal court devoted to domestic violence cases. The Milwaukee County Court System is very large 47 full-time judges and about 20 full-time court commissioners. The caseloads are massive, including 37,000 small claims cases per year.

The Milwaukee County Drug Court had 63 participants with room for up to 80. Rather than incarcerating individuals, Drug Court provides intense supervision and treatment in an attempt to bring offenders into recovery.

At the close of the day, all parties reconvened and discussed what they had seen.

"Our doors are always open," Chief Judge White said. "We'll definitely be back," Chief Judge White-Fish responded.

Participating in the trip were Judges: Eugene White-Fish, Christian Daniels and Jeryl Perenich; Clerks: Tina Bushong and Tara Kress; Wellness Court Coordinator Valerie Loduha, and Tribal Court Advisor Paul Stenzel.



OPEN HOUSE

It is common knowledge that drug-related incidents have been becoming a more frequent occurrence in Forest County over the last couple of years. These matters do not just hurt the individuals who are actually involved in the crime itself, but they affect others in a multitude of ways. The immediate and extended families of these people are affected. In addition, everyone in the county is also affected because of the need to pay higher taxes in dealing with drug-related issues. As was explained by the wellness court team, this initiative is being offered first as something to help — the addict — but also to address the needs of — the community. The Forest County Potawatomi (FCP) Tribal Court and the Forest County Circuit Court have come together as partners to help these individuals and all who are affected by their problem.

On Feb. 23, 2017, an open house was held at the FCP Tribal Courtroom to tell the community about this new strategy, which is a project that has been in the works since 2014. Both courts had developed an interest in this program and actually shadowed the Leech Lake Wellness Court to learn more about the process. A three-year planning grant was awarded in October 2014. From there, the teams took off with the goal being to learn all they could about wellness courts. During the open house, FCP Chief Judge Eugene White-Fish expressed his thoughts by saying, "This has to be a sincere commitment of the individual, because if the team feels that you don't qualify during this program, they will discharge you. We are looking for the ones who take this seriously, and they will be the ones who make it through. We hope they will change their lives around."

Forest County Judge Leon Stenz was next to talk with the audience saying, "A drug court is extensive supervision where we take evaluations of those who we think are most in-need and most at-risk, and we attempt to make a difference in their lives. There are no less than five cases each week that I see in my court that

are drug-related. Without addressing the underlining problem, which is the addiction, this will continue. It is hopeful that this program will help break that cycle of the addiction problem, and these people can change their life around.”

Valerie Loduha is the FCP tribal court wellness court coordinator, and she has been working diligently on developing the stages of this program with many others who are involved. Loduha offered an informational presentation to the people present at the open house and went into considerable depth discussing all of the qualifications that are needed and what will be expected from the people who are enrolled in such a program.

This program is currently open for 10 participants. This is on a volunteer basis, and an individual must fulfill the expectations of the program. If they do not, that person will then be sentenced to what has been ordered by the court. The program will last anywhere from 18-30 months, and the person will either complete the program or be discharged.

The qualifications for eligibility to proceed in this program are as follows: Must be 18 years of age or older; must be a resident of Forest County; can be native or non-native; must be convicted and have a history of criminal drunk driving (2-3), illegal substance charge and/or alcohol/drug-driven crimes; must not be a violent offender as defined by the federal definition; cannot be a sex offender; and must voluntarily agree to participate in the Wellness Court program. Again, these are just “some” of the rules to be eligible.

Involvement in the program will include assessment of the participant’s needs and a treatment/case plan will then be created. Intensive supervision and case management will be done for each individual. There will be frequent and random drug testing as well as AODA treatment with a focus on collaboration among agencies. Expectations for the participants in this program are set very high, and it will not be easy for everyone to comply. But if just one gets through the program, it will be worthwhile. The team says, “Show up. Try. Be honest.”

This wellness court can and will be a life-changing program

for the individuals involved. It will help them become able to live a sober life and enable them to have a future as reputable citizens of this community. It will also help their families who have already suffered so much along with them as they battled this all too-common problem. ♦

Bodwéwadmí Ktëgan

(Potawatomi Farm)

I have this memory from when I was about four years old. My babysitter had a garden. One day we were picking peas, and she showed us how to open up the pod and get the peas inside. I can still taste those peas: fresh, crisp, and juicy. I now grow peas in my own garden, and every year I wait anxiously for the pods to ripen so my daughter and I can pick and eat them.

Not everyone wants, or has the time, to grow their own food; however, we all can benefit from fresh, healthy, delicious, locally grown-foods. The Forest County Potawatomi Community decided having access to those foods was important enough to start a farm, the Bodwéwadmí Ktëgan. The mission is to provide a natural,

sustainable source of vegetables, fruits, greens, fish and animal proteins to the tribal community.

The first crops were planted in spring 2017. Most were planted in one of the three high tunnels that were built, thanks to a grant from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resource Conservation Service. These buildings work like a greenhouse, trapping heat, warming the ground, and protecting the plants from frost. This lets us start planting earlier in the spring and continue harvesting later into the fall – important when you have such a short growing season outside!

In almost no time, we had our first harvest: peas, beans, beets, and kohlrabi. Fresh from the field, they went to the tribe's day care, preschool, and elderly feeding program. When they weren't tending to the plants, our staff was busy caring for the chicks, pigs, and beef cattle who had arrived at the farm.

An orchard with apples, pears, and plums was also planted, but it will be a few years before they produce fruit. In the meantime, the chickens were given free range in the orchard. They loved searching out and eating the bugs, and we loved not having to spray the trees with chemicals. If that wasn't help enough, their nitrogen-rich waste helped fertilize the trees.

By fall, there was much to harvest: tomatoes, potatoes, onions, zucchini, peppers, and more. The high tunnels seemed to be bursting with food. In addition, the freezer was being stocked with pork, chicken, and beef. Calling this first year a success would be putting it mildly. In a little over six months, they took the idea of a farm and made it a reality.

Looking ahead, there will be even more growth at the Bodwéwadmī Ktëgan in the next few years. We are looking to double the space to grow vegetables. Berries will be

planted. More animals will be brought in. And, all will be grown and raised in a natural, sustainable way to nourish our bodies while also taking care of Mother Earth. ♦

You Can't Give What You Don't Have

When the doors first opened in 1995, the Forest County Potawatomi Health and Wellness Center (FCPHWC) had roughly 50 staff members and offered only a handful of specialty services. In 2000 the FCPHWC moved to its current location and the facility has seen many expansions and changes since that time. Two departments in particular, Medical and Optical, have embraced these changes and flourished. October of 2017 has brought about some of the largest changes for each of these departments.

The Medical Department welcomed Nurse Practitioner Marci McDonald into the FCPHWC family. Marci's addition to the department brings the total of Family Practice providers to six, the most that have ever been available for patients at FCPHWC.

Another provider to come aboard in October 2017 was Optometrist Dr. Kerry Griebenow. The Optical Department now gives patients easier access to care by having three doctors on staff. Coincidentally, Dr. Griebenow joined the Optical staff in the midst of an expansion to the physical space of the department. The FCPHWC Optical Department is currently undergoing construction that will more than double its size.

Recently, Dr. Robert Sookochoff, Chief Medical Officer, and Dr. Bill Pierre, optical director, answered a few questions about their experiences at FCPHWC.

When asked about some of the greatest changes that they have seen while employed at FCPHWC, Dr. Sookochoff cited that the improved access that patients have to providers has grown tremendously in all departments. He also mentioned that the Medical Department has seen a large growth in online scheduling recently through the Patient Portal, which is a "very progressive service not common among health care providers."

Dr. Pierre pointed out that due to the increase in services

and patients, the number of staff employed at FCPHWC has also grown tremendously over the years. "We have a great group practice team here. The clinicians and staff are excellent at supporting one another and supporting our patients. The spirit of cooperation and collaboration is the best that I have ever experienced," stated Dr. Sookochoff. He and Dr. Pierre both feel that there is a sense of family at the FCPHWC that not only includes the staff, but also the patients and clients.

Both providers agreed that the ability departments have to collaborate with one another is a huge benefit to the patient. "The work environment at FCPHWC is one of collaboration, both inter and intra-departmentally," stated Dr. Pierre. Dr. Sookochoff added that, "The opportunity to work with other tribal health departments (AODA, Community Health, Pharmacy, Behavioral Health) has provided a more holistic approach to healthcare in the community. Respecting tribal

culture within our practice parameters adds richness and history to our day-to-day activities.”

Even with all the growth at the FCPHWC has seen over the years, both providers feel that the home-town feel of the clinic has remained intact. “A characteristic of the FCPHWC that is appreciated by many patients and providers is the relaxed, yet professional feel,” Dr. Pierre pointed out. To that, Dr. Sookochoff added,



“There is a personal approach here. Patients are not just a number or a slot to be filled. We provide concierge medicine, without the large fee.”

In his response to the question of what he finds most fulfilling about his role at the FCPHWC, Dr. Pierre mentioned the relationships that he has been able to develop with patients and staff over the years. One notable example of this is a patient that he started seeing in the Optical Department when the patient was two years old. That patient, now 19, was just in for a routine exam. When asked the same question, Dr. Sookochoff stated that, “Although emergencies are not common in the clinic, I have been so impressed with the staff and provider response when emergencies occur. Providers and staff rush to help people when they are most in need of help.” He goes on to mention that in his year as the Chief Medical Officer at the FCPHWC, he has received multiple personal notes of thanks from patients and patients’ families that have been helped by the providers and staff at the clinic.

Twenty two years ago, the FCPHWC was created to fill a void in the tribal community. That role continues to expand to encompass the needs of the whole county and surrounding communities. “Health care is a basic human need and the FCPHWC does an excellent job at providing that care for the tribal and non-tribal communities we serve. FCPHWC offers great access to high quality acute and preventative care in a positive and nurturing environment. We are continuously improving our efforts at improving the patient experience,” says Dr. Sookochoff. ♦


