First Chief's Day to be Celebrated

When approving the 2020-21 holiday schedule, one culturally significant change was made. The federal holiday designated as President's Day (which falls on February 15 this year) will now also be celebrated by the FCP Community as Chief's Day per the approval of Executive Council. To that end, the *Traveling Times* will be collaborating with the FCP Museum on a continuing series highlighting past leaders as a way to honor them. A series actually began in 2019 and included facts on the first two documented chiefs: Waumegesako and Keetos/Quitos. As a way of reigniting the series, the first article is reprinted below. Stay tuned for more cultural history to come in future issues.

As printed in the Nov. 1, 2019 issue:

In celebration of and respect and honor for Native American History Month, *Potawatomi Traveling Times* (PTT) has decided to embark on a journey to look at the history of the tribe's Chiefs/Chairmen. It should be noted that every attempt has been made to be as accurate as possible in regards to dates, names and facts. PTT collaborated with the Forest County Potawatomi (FCP) Cultural Preservation Division (CPD) and the Wisconsin Historical Society in gathering this information. It's felt to be accurate as it is presented, but know that some important facts may be missing as well. PTT is relying on available records.

To start this series, PTT ventured to the FCP Executive Building Auditorium to observe and make note of the exhibited photos – from the first one through the most recent photo of the current Chairman. PTT also had a list (revised on March 25, 2011) called the FCP Community of Wisconsin: Generations of Tribal Chairs 1937 – Present, with this added notation: Materials used to develop this record come from Executive and General Council minutes. The Legal Department does not have in its possession copies of all existing Council minutes; therefore, this may not be a complete, accurate

record. Please contact Legal Department with any corrections or additional information.

After taking time in gathering some information, this is what PTT and the FCP CPD have come up with in starting this new venture.

The first Chief to be documented is Waumegesako (1830s – 1844), also known as Wampum and Mexico. Born in 1789, he was head chief of the mixed tribes of Ojibwe, Potawatomi and Odawa residing in the Manitowoc area. Taken from *The Wisconsin Archaeologist* Vol. 32, No. 4, supplied by the Wisconsin Historical Society, it says, "Old Mexico, also known as Waumegesako and Wampum, was the head chief of the Potawatomi Indians. Wampum's headquarters were on the Manitowoc River. The old chief died in 1844. The citizens of the Manitowoc erected a monument at the old village of Manitowoc Rapids in honor of Wampum."

Waumegesako played a prominent part in signed treaties including: Butte des Morts (1827), Green Bay (1828), Prairie du Chien (1829), Chicago (1833). Another analog from *The Wisconsin Archaeologist* Vol. 32, No. 4, says, "In 1828, a deputation of fifteen Indians and one squaw traveled to Washington to conclude and sign the article of agreement of the Treaty of Green Bay. 'Way-meek-see-go, or Wampum' was one of them."

Waumegesako died in 1844. According to *The Wisconsin Archaeologist* Vol. 14, No. 4, His grave is located on Mr. Winke's land, on the highest crest on the north bank of the river, several hundred yards west of the Braunel cemetery and close to an old abandoned logging road. It is a quarter of a mile southwest of the location of the monument erected to his memory. The grave, and others purporting to be his, have on various occasions been disturbed. In 1851, three prominent citizens of Manitowoc, removed therefrom the skull and thigh bones, which were to be utilized in the gruesome initiation ceremonies of a well-known secret society organized at that time. One of these was

Charles Musson, after whom Dr. Lapham names a group of mounds in Manitowoc. On this becoming known the indignation of the Indians was great and dire threats were made producing consternation among the settlers. Quiet was speedily restored when the contents of the graves were returned."

Waumegesako was described as intelligent and "absolutely trusted" by white settlers and Native Americans alike.

Succeeding Waumegesako was Keetos (1844-1867), also known as Quitos or Queetos.


Keetos or Quitos means "sun go one place", and he was described as "one of the Potawatomi leaders or chiefs". His grandson is one of many familiar names for the FCP tribe, that being Simon Kahquados. With that said, Kahquados wrote saying his grandfather spoke four languages and credited him with stopping wars between Native Americans and whites in the United States. He also said that Keetos, "...went all over with his uncle, Nea-to-shingh, and his father, Ah-kee-way-see, telling the Indians not to fight with the whites." Simon said Keetos was "Wampum's (Waumegesako) best friend." Peter D. Sapenais stated that Keetos' real name was Kee-Ka-Tos. He also relayed that Keetos was Ottawa and came from Canada.

Keetos died about eight miles east of DePere in 1867, and according to Simon Kahquados was, "...aged about 100 years."

PTT has decided to carry on this series into the next issue, Nov. 15, 2019. Next on the list is Charles Kisheck and John Shawano. Strap on a set of snowshoes and go for a hike. Or try your hand at ice fishing on one of our local lakes. As we all know, winter can be a long season in Wisconsin. So, make the most of this time and get outside before the weather turns too ugly.

Unfortunately, we have recently seen some ugliness in our country. The recent events at the U.S. Capitol in Washington, D.C. were shocking and appalling. Lives were unnecessarily lost, and it has left many of us stunned. It was heartbreaking to see it unfold on TV.

But that is over, and today is a new day. Today, President-elect Joe Biden will officially become the 46th President of the United States. The 2021 Bug Lake Fisheree is scheduled for Saturday, Jan. 30. Registration opens at 9 a.m. and closes at 3 p.m. Chili sack lunches will be available from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Categories include bass, trout, perch, pumpkinseed and northern pike. Reminder that there's a limit of three lines per person. Social distancing will be implemented at the pop-up canopy on the boat landing.

January is Radon Awareness Month: Radon is a cancer-causing radioactive gas and is a national environmental health problem. The Surgeon General warns that radon is the second leading cause of lung cancer in the United States today. You cannot see, smell or taste radon, but it may be a problem in your home. If you smoke and your home has high radon levels, you're at high risk for developing lung cancer. Some studies indicate that children may be more sensitive. Testing is the only way to know your home's radon levels. There are no immediate symptoms and it typically takes years of exposure before any problems surface. The Forest County Health Department can help you in obtaining a testing kit for a small fee. Hello, FCP Community.

The Incident Command System is still at a Level 1 of a virtual Full-Scale Activation.

Forest County Health officials have confirmed one additional person has been diagnosed with COVID-19 for a total of 895 cases in Forest County. As of yesterday, Jan. 19, we are down to only four confirmed active cases. Currently, there are 0 active cases living on the FCP reservation or FCP tribal members within Forest County. This is great news, everyone! This means people have been doing their part and we are finally starting to flatten the curve in our county. So, please continue to stay safe and use extra precautions when out in public so we can bring this number down to 0.

On another positive note, last Tuesday, Jan. 12, COVID care packages were mailed out to FCP tribal members 18 and older to help protect against COVID-19. I would like to add that FCP purchased these supplies with federal funding, so there was no additional cost to the tribe. In the last two weeks, FCP received an additional 95 doses of Pfizer vaccine for the second doses. These were administered on Jan. 6, three weeks after the initial dose. It takes about 10 days after the inoculation to fully develop protective antibodies, so by now the initial vaccine recipients are 97 percent protected – an excellent start. An additional 200 doses of the Moderna vaccine have been received. One hundred of these doses will be used for frontline casino employees and Potawatomi elders in Milwaukee. The second 100 doses for the week of Jan. 25, will be a boost for healthcare employees, caregivers, and FCP members. At this time, the target populations remain tribal elders, their spouses and caregivers, as well as high-risk tribal members and frontline essential FCP employees. FCP tribal members and employees remain our highest priority.

It was announced this week that a vaccine developed by Johnson & Johnson is likely to receive FDA emergency use authorization by the end of the month. This vaccine has been shown in trials to be 97 percent effective. It is a much more traditional vaccine, using similar technology as the existing vaccines against pneumococcal pneumonia and meningitis. It is also a single shot as opposed to the two current vaccines which require two shots. The federal government has ordered 100 million doses with an option for an additional 200 million doses. For those wondering about which vaccine to receive, the simple answer is, whichever vaccine is available. They are all safe and effective and MUCH safer than contracting COVID-19 disease. I encourage everyone to get vaccinated as soon as vaccine is available.

As of Jan. 12, the HWC lab had done 1,851 COVID tests. Of these, 276 were positive, a positivity rate of 15 percent. Our lab uses a test called a rapid antigen test. The test is performed on a nasal swab and can be done within 15 minutes. The test does have some limitations. There are only about 2 percent false positives, so a positive test means you do have the virus. For those that have COVID-19 symptoms such as cough, fever, shortness of breath, or a loss of taste and smell, the false negative rate is 20 percent, so one-fifth of the time the test will be negative even if you have the disease.

He married Rogerine Wychesit on June 28, 1969.


Robert enjoyed the casino, camping, fishing, hunting, riding his motorcycle, and working on cars. He loved sharing stories of his life experiences and adventures.



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For those who do not have symptoms, such as asymptomatic carriers or people early in the course of their disease, the false negative rate rises to 60 percent. Under those circumstances, a PCR test,

which detects small amounts of viral genetic material, is far more sensitive. They require samples to be sent out to a reference lab. They can take from 2-12 hours to complete, and when you add in transportation time, it means results may

be delayed for several days.

Given the limitations of the rapid antigen test it means that our testing probably underestimates the prevalence of the corona virus within our community and reinforces the need to continue the basic public health measures of masking, social distancing, avoiding large groups

and hand hygiene to limit transmission.

If you have COVID symptoms, please contact the HWC and you will receive a same-day or next-day appointment for testing.

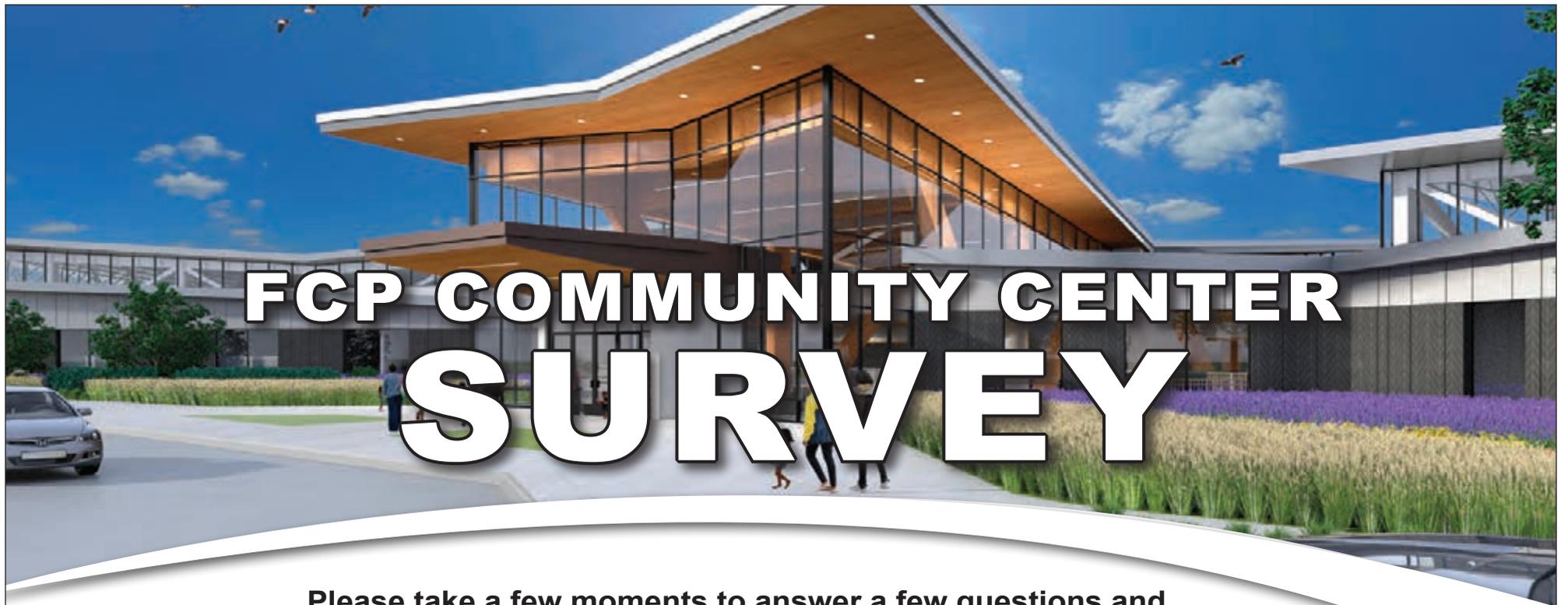

PBDC Acquires NATIVE ROOTS HEMP

Get to know Potawatomi Business Development Corporation's newest acquisition, Native Roots Hemp!

Why did PBDC enter the hemp market?

During 2019 the FCP Executive Council directed PBDC to evaluate the Hemp market and make a recommendation for how FCP could invest in this industry. PBDC Management and the PBDC Board of Directors spent a number of months evaluating the overall Hemp Market with the goal of identifying opportunities and the steps involved to the first investment. Based on the research, the PBDC Board of Directors and Management recommended to the FCP Executive Council that the initial entry in the Hemp Market would be for the CBD segment of the market. Once that recommendation was made, PBDC researched approximately 25 companies that could meet the investment goal and Native Roots Hemp was the leader for the investment. In late August 2020, PBDC completed its search and selected Native Roots Hemp as our first investment and partnership.



After suffering for decades with the after effects of the medications and pain of ulcerative colitis, Stacy Deprey Purper found a special kind of hemp plant - the one that doesn't get you high and touts medicinal benefits over thousands of years by natural health specialists. After living with daily pain, and trying every medication and natural product, she was ready to try just about any alternative healing to improve her quality of life. She found hemp. Today, Stacy lives pain free and lives what she feels is a healthier life through hemp. She immediately knew she wanted to share this amazing plant with everyone she could and decided to launch in Algoma, WI, her hometown.

How did it grow?

At first, Native Roots Hemp gave away hemp & cbd samples and asked people to survey the product and report back in one week's time. The team also made sure to follow up with each customer by phone, ensuring customer satisfaction and effectiveness of the products. Before long, the products boasted an 80+% repeat order rate. At that time, the company knew it needed to control the life-cycle of the product to keep costs down and quality high; thus, the Native Roots extraction division was born, to help small, local, farmers who were finding it difficult to find processors. Through controlling the life-cycle of the product as well as the quality of the plant materials used, Native Roots Hemp was well on its way to becoming vertically integrated. That started in 2018 and launched the company's guarantee: Highest quality, lowest prices.



What are some of the other uses for hemp?

On an annual basis, one acre of hemp will produce as much fiber as 2 to 3 acres of cotton, is stronger and softer than cotton, lasts twice as long as cotton, and will not mildew. One acre of hemp also produces as much paper as 2-4 acres of trees. Not only is the hemp plant full of dozens of phytonutrients our body needs to balance our internal system, but the possibilities are endless when it comes to using the leftover hemp stalk and biomass as a renewable resource for things like: eyeglass frames, toothbrush holders, clothing, replacing cardboard boxes with hemp boxes, using spent biomass for bedding or pelletizing it for use in replacing wood for fire. The possibilities truly are endless. Every single part of the hemp plant can be used from root to flower.

Who are our customers?

It is a scientific fact that humans need phytocannabinoids (phyto-can-NAH-bi-noyds) from plants to fill our body's receptors and to live in a state of balance. In essence, the world is our customer. However, most of our users tell us they seek out hemp when they are experiencing an imbalance of that system such as pain, inflammation, anxiety and sleep disorders. 75% of our customer base is over the age of 55. The remaining customers break down into blue-collar workers of all ages who have reported aches and pains and people who suffer from anxiety (20-40 years old).

Today, our products are sold online, in our two flagship locations in Luxemburg and De Pere, WI, as well as several other wholesale accounts such as chiropractic clinics, pain clinics and retail locations. These markets are quickly expanding with PBDC resources.



In the fall of 2020, Native Roots Hemp moved from its original location in Algoma to De Pere, WI in order to set the stage for retail growth. The new De Pere location has already proven to be the perfect home to continue to expand the operations.

The leading products include original tinctures, gummies, relief balms and creams. With the new location in De Pere that opened November 2, 2021, the team introduced a line of 11 hemp teas, which have grown quickly in popularity as well as our line of skincare products and raw, Wisconsin-grown hemp flower.

The team at Native Roots Hemp consists of a certified herbalist, a scientist, a wholesale account executive, and its founder. The



company is actively looking for a Marketing Manager to continue the expansion of online sales and has also added a part-time retail associate who works with customers on a day-to-day basis in De Pere, WI.

As a vertically integrated hemp company that Deprey-Purper likes to call a "Hempnary" Native Roots Hemp is poised for rapid expansion. "We are just touching the surface of the renewable and health benefits of this amazing plant. As healthcare also continues to evolve, and more people are searching out natural ways to heal the body, I see hemp on the forefront of that movement."
