Indigenous Peoples' Day Youth Event

Students from Laona and Cran- don School Districts attended the Indigenous Peoples' Day Youth Event Oct. 13, 2023, at the Potawatomi Community Center. The buses arrived at 9 a.m. for a day filled with presentations, activities, knowledge, snacks, and lunch. Students gathered in the turf room at 10 a.m. to join Wisconsin State Director of ACE (Action for the Climate Emergency) Marco Marquez. Marquez began his presentation discussing climate change, provided education, and inspired the students to become future leaders.

Throughout the presentation, Marquez shared a short video featuring a sixth-generation farmer out of Georgia sharing his story of climate change and how it has affected his family farm throughout the years. Flooding and drought have affected their ability to consistently produce crops for market. With that, he and

his dad joined the Cobb County Farm Bureau to share the importance of climate change and how it's affecting our everyday lives. They visit schools to educate classrooms about agriculture, climate change, and ways students can help. It's important for youth to know about the changes and the effects of the world today.

Marquez continued his presentation educating the students on the importance of voting and how they can make an impact in the world. Though many may be too young to vote, Marquez encouraged the students to act now to help slow down and stop climate change. They are the generation of our future and those generations to come. Their voice matters and it's important they understand that.

The students took a short break before starting the next activity. After a few rounds of volleyball, basketball, smash net, and testing out the new pedal walkers, everyone headed back into the turf room for a fun voting activity. They joined into groups of 10, came up with their own district names, elected their representative for their district, and voted on who it would be. Each group came up with two different rules to follow for the remaining of the day, shared it with their representative and voted on the rules they wanted. Between the six rules total, only three passed. Some of the students didn't like the outcome, but it was a good activity to show the students what it's like to vote and how much their voice truly matters. They may not always get the results they want, but it gives them more of a reason to continue voting so their voice is heard.

After a short break for lunch,

everyone gathered for the next presentation by Land and Natural Resources (LNR.) Energy Sustainability Specialist Alexander Lange joined the stage to share information about their division and all they do for the community. He shared a short video, discussed plans for more solar and renewable energy, and shared information about their new electric Ford F-150 Lightning. Students had been patiently waiting all day to check out the new truck, all of its features, and ask the many questions they had.

Following LNR's presentation, Museum Director Donald Keeble wrapped up the day with a short presentation of Potawatomi Culture and History. The students gathered into a circle while Keeble shared stories and information about the culture and history. He continued to ask the students to share one thing they are grateful for. A majority expressed the importance of family and how much they are grateful for them. Snacks arrived catered by Anticipations Sweets and Such from Elcho, Wis. They arrived just in time for the students to enjoy before they head out for the day. Goodie bags filled with fun gifts like Brewer's bobbleheads, baseball caps, bucket hats, mini board games and more were given to each student as a token of appreciation for attending the event.

As the day came to an end, the students reflected on their day at the community center, embraced their heritage, learned more about their culture, what they can do for our future, the importance of their voice, and the impact they have in the world. It was a great experience and opportunity to raise awareness of their abilities,

the importance of their lives, and the responsibility they hold within this world, for the many generations to come.

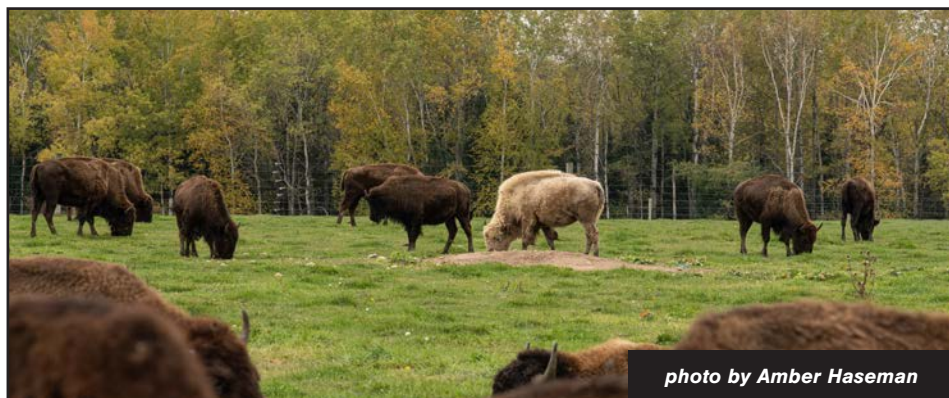

It was a great time for everyone to see and hear the exciting new things Public Works has been up to and is planning for the future.

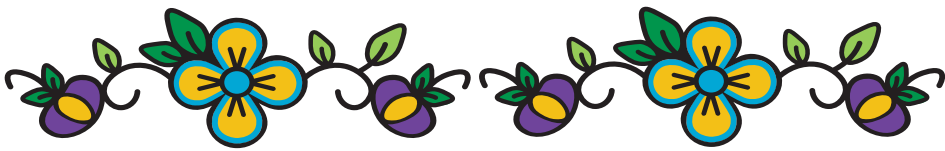
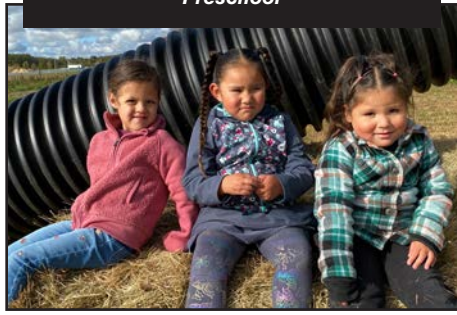
Gte Ga Nēs Field Trip

Medicine Workshop with Dr. Foster

A Medicine Workshop was held on Oct. 17, 2023, at the FCP Cultural Center, Library & Museum. This workshop was led by Dr. David Foster, Ph.D., who is a master botanist and has been a Professor of Environmental Science and Biology for over 20 years.

Dr. Foster, his assistant and Richard Gougé took time before this workshop to gather an immense amount of plant species on the reservation to present their medicinal or edible uses. Dr. Foster noted that in a mile walk, they identified 77 species of plants. Foster also brought many different species of his own and explained how they are helpful in healing ailments or simply cooking with them.

The class was filled with elders and children who could try different plants, berries and teas that were all picked right outside the door. It was a fun and interactive workshop to be a part of.

Dr. Foster had the Potawatomi names for most of these plants, thanks to his long-time work with the late Jim Thunder. Dr. Foster and Gougé both know how important it is to keep these teachings in the community so that everyone can keep learning and passing this knowledge down to the next generations.

It was an exceptional workshop to be a part of and hopefully, many more will be held in the future.
