Health & Wellness Celebrates 30 Years



Everyone awaiting the tree lighting

Three decades ago marked a historic milestone for Forest County Potawatomi (FCP) and the surrounding community. The original Health & Wellness Center (HWC), located in the Family Services/IT building, opened in 1995 and became the heart of health care in Forest County. It provided medical, dental, and community health care services to tribal members, residents of Forest County, and neighboring communities.

According to *Potawatomi Traveling Times*, Volume 6, Issue 1, a resolution authorizing the construction of a new HWC was passed by the FCP General Council on Aug. 28, 1999. Construction began shortly after, with a groundbreaking ceremony held on Sept. 3, 1999. The WPC Group, a

Native American general contractor, brought the architect's vision to life, creating a new facility to serve the community.

The new center expanded on existing services, introducing an enhanced radiological facility including the only mammography machine in Forest County. Additional space was added for speech, occupational, and physical therapy. When the facility opened in 2000, it offered a wide range of services, including a pharmacy, dental care, optical services, behavioral health services, radiology, community health programs, diabetes treatment, maternal health services, and chiropractic care.

Over the years, the HWC has continued to grow through several renovations, expansion projects, multi-phase upgrades, open house events, ground blessings, and, most recently, a renovation that provides more services through expanded central registration, pharmacy services, a drive-through pharmacy, additional lab and patient space, and welcomed a mobile MRI unit.

To honor 30 years of service and growth, the HWC celebrated its anniversary on Dec. 11, 2025, welcoming the community from 1 to 5 p.m. Fire Nation opened the event with a powerful performance for the grand entry, while FCP veterans posted their color guard. Health Division Administrator Tom Boelter welcomed attendees and introduced Ned Daniels Jr., who offered opening remarks and a prayer.

"For many years, we didn't have a place like this to heal our people," Daniels shares. "There was no place to get our teeth cleaned, no place to get medicine, and no place for parents to bring their babies when they were feeling sickly." He reflected on how far the community has come, recognizing that the HWC now provides the much-needed services for healing. He continues to share, "What started with a prayer has grown into this facility. Helping the community is a cornerstone of the Potawatomi people."

FCP Tribal Member Brenda Shopodock followed with opening remarks, thanking the creator for the beautiful day and for bringing the community together to celebrate what she described as "30 years of a miracle and a blessing." She shared memories of being born in the Laona Hospital, which no longer exists, and growing up without running water or sewer services. She shares, "Back in those times, we didn't have dental, didn't have a clinic, an executive building, or a community center." She recalls getting everyone into a big van and taking them to a dental school where they received their care. Shopodock further emphasized the importance of hope for the future, expressed her gratitude to Boelter and the Health & Wellness staff, and the facility for helping the community improve and heal.

Health Advisory Board member Donna VanZile shared historical reflections, honoring leaders who have

helped shape the community's health-care services. She recognized Ray McGeshick of the Sokaogon Chippewa Tribe, along with FCP members Delores Mann, Virginia Jacobson, and Mary Daniels. She reflected on the early years of community healthcare, explaining how services were provided by visiting people in their homes, taking the time and effort to understand the types of needs and care people wanted, all in the comfort of their homes. She shared, "What we have and what we didn't have in terms of health care, today is a tremendous and great blessing."

Boelter continued the program, thanking the speakers and recognizing each department within the Health Division for their dedication and the heart they put into their care. He highlighted new equipment, the evolution of the HWC throughout the years, and its ongoing development. He recognized the new autism team and plans for the program, and introduced the Health Advisory Board. Boelter concluded by expressing his honor of serving the community.

Potawatomi Ventures (PV) Tribal Relations Director Heather VanZile and PV Board Director and FCP Behavioral Health Manager Shelby Daniels followed, speaking on behalf of PV. VanZile shares that this is a momentous time for the HWC. She shared the importance of PV's role in bridging the gap between tribal members and business entities, as well as

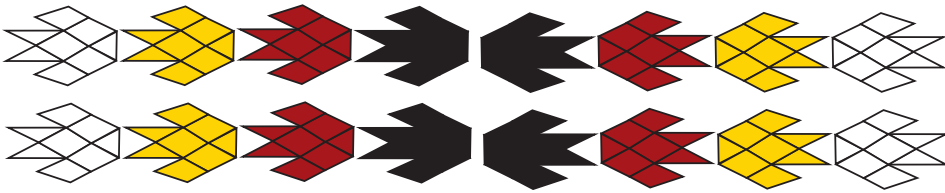

The celebration continued with a tree lighting, celebrating life, growth, and connection. Tribal members were invited to help decorate the tree with ornaments that represent themselves. The ceremony concluded with Fire Nation performing an honor song for all who contributed to the HWC over the past 30 years. Veterans retired their color guard, and attendees were invited to tour departments, enjoy food and refreshments, participate in holiday activities and crafts, visit with Santa and Mrs. Claus, and continue building stronger connections within the Health & Wellness community.
